- · forensic/evidentiary services
- · counseling
- · advocacy
- · accompaniment
- · information about rights and options to help victims make informed choices and decisions

The Rape Treatment Center also provides on-going, longer-term, trauma-informed therapy and other support services for victims and their significant others.

Ashe Student Health Center

If survivor chooses to be seen at the Ashe Center for a sexual assault then...

A. If assault occurred: within the last 5 days/120 hours

B. If assault occurred: more than 5 days/120 hours

Schedule appointment with an Ashe clinician (or telehealth appointment if living outside the LA area) via the Patient Portal or by phone at 310.825.4073

#### Ashe Center provider:

- will refer survivor to the UCLA Rape Treatment Center (RTC) for a medical exam, resources, and to be connected with a Sexual Assault Response Team (SART) advocate, if survivor lives in the LA area.
- if survivor lives outside the LA area, provider will refer survivor to UCLÁ RTC or RAINN (at 1-800-656-HOPE) for services/resources in their área.
- will connect survivor to an Ashe Clinical Coordinator (optional).
- will offer the survivor the option to be referred to the UCLA CARE office for on-campus support.
- may be obligated to make a report to ÚCPD. However, the survivor is <u>not</u> obligated to make a report or respond to UCPD, if contacted.

#### If living in Los Angeles:

Visit Ashe clinician for medical needs

### If living outside of the Los Angeles area:

4 additional options are...

- 1. Survivor lives in California: Can contact the UCLA Rape Treatment Center (RTC) to receive resources via telehealth (i.e., counseling and other supportive services).
- 2. Survivor lives outside of California: Can contact UCLA Rape Treatment Center to be connected with resources in your state.
- 3. Survivor lives in/outside of California -andneeds medical care/a forensic exam: Can contact RAINN at 1-800-656-HOPE.
- 4. Contact an Ashe Clinical Coordinator for assistance and be connected with UCLA CAPS and UCLA CARE for additional support.

Important Notes: (1) If a sexual assault is disclosed during a routine medical appointment, then provider will follow either path A or B. (2) Survivor can always directly contact the UCLA Rape Treatment Center (RTC) and make an appointment to the UCLA CARE office on their own.

# CARE Office

The CARE Program is a confidential office that does not have to report incidents to Title IX or UCPD.

#### CARE Confidential Advocates offer free services that include:

- information and access to all reporting processes, such as Title IX and law enforcement
- academic, housing, and work accommodations
- No Contact Orders and restraining orders
- · self-care and safety planning
- · campus and community resource
- crisis intervention
- accompaniment to all Title IX, Law enforcement meetings, etc.

Offers an array of workshops and trainings to provide a pro-active preventive educational approach to sexual violence for UCLA student organizations and their leadership teams, and custom workshops and community spaces for student organization or departments to address root causes of violence and harm.
